

A reading from Numbers:

⁴The rabble among them had a strong craving; and the Israelites also wept again, and said, "If only we had meat to eat! ⁵We remember the fish we used to eat in Egypt for nothing, the cucumbers, the melons, the leeks, the onions, and the garlic; ⁶but now our strength is dried up, and there is nothing at all but this manna to look at."

¹⁰Moses heard the people weeping throughout their families, all at the entrances of their tents. Then the LORD became very angry, and Moses was displeased. ¹¹So Moses said to the LORD, "Why have you treated your servant so badly? 





UPDATE FROM ST. PAUL'S SCHOOL BOARD OF DIRECTORS

We established decisive dates to achieve critical milestones that must be met for us to be positioned to offer classes beginning in January.
