FAT CAMELS AND NARROW NEEDLES: ONLY POSSIBLE FOR GOD

A rich man approaches Jesus and asks how to inherit eternal life. Jesus tells him to sell what he owns, give the money to the poor, and follow. Jesus will accept nothing less than our very selves. Like the rich man, we too are left defenseless and grieving by Jesus' radical call to leave behind and give away what we count on for our own security. He wants us, and therefore also wants the things that keep us from him; he gazes upon us in love, even as he calls us to leave behind our false sources of security. How hard it is for us camels to pass through the eye of the needle! We too grieve at the impossibility. It is in fact impossible for us, yet more than possible for God to make it so. For we have a "great high priest who has passed through the heavens, the Son of God," who is both able to sympathize with our great weakness but also to provide mercy and help. While eternal life on the other side of the needle is a free gift that only God can give, it is a gift that claims the entirety of our lives and therefore reshapes our stewardship of whatever earthly goods we do have. For first and foremost we are called to follow the Christ who gazes upon us in love. Since we are his, following him we will enter through the eye of the needle, leaving behind what cannot fit through with us. In doing so we are promised that we will gain everything: a hundredfold more in this life in a new community under the Cross, "and in the age to come eternal life" (Mark 10:30).

NEXT SUNDAY'S READINGS: Sunday, October 20--Lectionary 29

Each Sunday we assemble around the cross. Next Sunday this Christian movement is evident in all of the readings. In the Spirit we celebrate Christ's resurrection, for God has saved Jesus and us all from death.

Mark 10:35-45: The cup we share and the baptism we undergo are signs of the death of Christ, whose glory is the cross. Yet our confidence in the victory of Christ leads us away from domineering attitudes and into lives of service.

Isaiah 53:4-12: The passage from Isaiah, most well-known as the first reading on Good Friday, is set next to Mark's words about the cross since the Old Testament passages such as the fourth Servant Song were essential material for early Christian interpretation of the death of Christ. Evangelists who were not present at Jesus' death describe the crucifixion in language taken from Isaiah 53.

Hebrews 5:1-10: Jesus Christ, the source of eternal salvation, sacrificed himself for the people, and we follow him by living as servants of one another. Hebrews stresses not Jesus' victimization, but his authority as high priest and his willingness to suffer. We speak about this as the mystery of Christ.

UPCOMING COMMEMORATIONS

Teresa of Avila, teacher, renewer of the church, died 1582 Tuesday, October 15, 2024

A mystical writer and reformer of the monastic order (Carmelites) to which she belonged, Teresa may also be commemorated with John of the Cross on December 14. Latino Christians traditionally remember her on this date.

Ignatius, Bishop of Antioch, martyr, died around 115 Thursday, October 17, 2024

Ignatius was the second bishop of Antioch in Syria, the city where the name "Christians" originated. Ignatius is known to us from his letters, which encouraged Christians to live in love, yet stand firm in true doctrine.

Luke, Evangelist Friday, October 18, 2024

Identified as the author of both Luke and Acts, Luke was careful to place the events of Jesus' life in their social and religious contexts. His gospel gives us some of the most beloved parables, as well as the songs of Zechariah, Mary, the angels, and Simeon. From sundaysandseasons.com.
