CONFESSION AND ASSURANCE

Romans 3:23-24 2 Timothy 1:9

We serve a holy God who desires a holy people.

We, too, desire to be a holy people who fully reflect God's glory.

A reading from Romans:

⁹Now we know that whatever the law says, it speaks to those who are under the law, so that every mouth may be silenced, and the whole world may be held accountable to God. ²⁰For "no human being will be justified in the sight of God" by deeds prescribed by the law, for through the law comes the knowledge of sin.

²¹But now, apart from law, the righteousness of God has been disclosed, and is attested by the law and the prophets, ²²the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction, ²³since all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God; ²⁴they are now justified by God's grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, ²⁵whom God put forward as a sacrifice of atonement by his blood, effective through faith. This was to show God's righteousness, because in divine forbearance God had passed over the sins previously committed; ²⁶it was to prove at the present time that God is righteous and that God justifies the one who has faith in Jesus.

²⁷Then what becomes of boasting? It is excluded. By what law? By that of works? No, but by the law of faith. ²⁸For we hold that a person is justified by faith apart from works prescribed by the law.

REFORMATION DAY

During the sixteenth century, some German Lutheran churches celebrated an annual thanksgiving day for the Reformation. In 1667 the festival was set for October 31 or the Sunday prior, since by then it was popularly believed that on this date in 1517 Martin Luther posted the Ninety-Five Theses on the Wittenberg church door, in anticipation of people coming to worship on November 1, All Saints Day, to view saints' relics. Scholars now question whether this actually occurred, and so we need to take care how we deal with this beloved legend. (The posting may have been a mailing to his bishop.) The point of this festival is the continuing need for perpetual reformation of all churches, rather than any Lutheran self-congratulation.

REFORMATION SUNDAY

This day invites the daughters and sons of the Reformation to celebrate the perennial source of reform in the church: the word of God and the gifts of forgiveness and new life. Indeed, when the church welcomes a new member in holy baptism or gathers around the table of holy communion, the Holy Spirit's reforming labor continues among us. This is a day to acknowledge that our souls are captive to the word of God, that we share the life of Christ with other Christians through holy baptism, and that we are urged by the Holy Spirit to pray for the ongoing renewal of the church in our day.

FALL BACK NEXT SATURDAY

Before you go to bed on Saturday, November 2, you will want to set your clocks back by one hour. Enjoy the extra hour of sleep before we celebrate All Saints Sunday with our pastoral candidate preaching and presiding over Holy Communion. Worship will be immediately followed by a congregational meeting.


CARVE OUT TIME FOR THE YOUTHERANS

Happy Eco-Reformation Sunday! For all that God our creator has given us and strives to preserve and protect, explore how you can join our church's work of ongoing renewal in caring for creation at LutheransRestoringCreation.org. This attention and service embodies what Martin Luther, in his Small Catechism, confessed: "I believe that God has created me together with all that exists. . . God daily and abundantly provides . . . all the necessities and nourishment for this body and life. God protects me against all danger and shields and preserves me from all evil . . . For all of this I owe it to God to thank and praise, serve and obey [God]" (*ELW*, p. 1162).

COMMENTS FROM THE CLOUD OF WITNESSES

Every renewal of the church essentially consists in an increase of fidelity to her own calling. Undoubtedly this explains the dynamism of the movement toward unity. Christ summons the church, as she goes her pilgrim way, to that continual reformation of which she always has need, insofar as she is a human institution here on earth. Consequently, if, in various times and circumstances, there have been deficiencies in moral conduct or in church discipline, or even in the way that church teaching has been formulated—to be carefully distinguished from the deposit of faith itself—these should be set right at the opportune moment and in the proper way.

THEOLOGICAL REFLECTION

"We are descendants of Abraham and have never been slaves to anyone. What do you mean by saying, 'You will be made free'?" (John 8:33). The children of Abraham experienced slavery in Egypt, and the suffering of a people unable to live freely. Though these descendants are far removed from those days of slavery in Egypt, they are still under the rule of an empire not their own. Are they so captive to generations of suffering that they don't dare trust that they could finally be free? Are we like them? When Jesus talks about being a slave to sin, can we hear him describing not just our personal failings, but those systems of injustice that continue to bind our communities, those unhealthy patterns that are passed down through the generations unaware?

ALL SAINTS DAY—NEXT SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 3

The custom of commemorating on a single day all the saints of the church, especially the many unknown martyrs, originated in the fourth century. By the eighth century, the festival commemorating all saints had been moved in England and Ireland to November 1 in order to Christianize the Celtic harvest festival of Samhain, which marked the beginning of winter and communal attention to the dead. In current Christian use, the day is dedicated to thanksgiving for all the unnamed who have died in the Lord. In many assemblies, including ours, the names of those who have died over the previous twelve months are read aloud, a practice originally associated with All Souls Day on November 2. The conflation of the two emphases fits with the Protestant belief that the all the Christian dead are saints and none needs release from purgatory.
