HOLY BAPTISM

PRESENTATION

God, who is rich in mercy and love, gives us a new birth into a living hope through the sacrament of baptism. By water and the Word God delivers us from sin and death and raises us to new life in Jesus Christ. We are united with all the baptized in the one body of Christ, anointed with the gift of the Holy Spirit, and joined in God's mission for the life of the world.

The sponsor presents the candidate:

I present Patrick William Burian for baptism.

The presiding minister addresses the parents:

Called by the Holy Spirit, trusting in the grace and love of God, do you desire to have your child baptized into Christ?

Response: I do.

As you bring your child to receive the gift of baptism, you are entrusted with responsibilities:

to live with him among God's faithful people, bring him to the word of God and the holy supper, teach him the Lord's Prayer, the Creed, and the Ten Commandments, place in his hands the holy scriptures, and nurture him in faith and prayer, so that your child may learn to trust God, proclaim Christ through word and deed, care for others and the world God made,

Do you promise to help your child grow in the Christian faith and life? *Response:* I do.

The presiding minister addresses the sponsors:

and work for justice and peace.

Do you promise to nurture this person in the Christian faith as you are empowered by God's Spirit, and to help him live in the covenant of baptism and in communion with the church?

Response: I do.

The presiding minister addresses the assembly:

People of God, do you promise to support Patrick and pray for him in his new life in Christ?

We do.

PROFESSION OF FAITH

The presiding minister addresses the parents and sponsor of the baptismal candidate. I ask you to profess your faith in Christ Jesus, reject sin, and confess the faith of the church.

Do you renounce the devil and all the forces that defy God?

Response:

I renounce them.

Do you renounce the powers of this world that rebel against God?

Response:

I renounce them.

Do you renounce the ways of sin that draw you from God?

Response:

I renounce them.

The presiding minister addresses all who are gathered:

Do you believe in God the Father?

I believe in God, the Father almighty,

creator of heaven and earth.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord,

who was conceived by the Holy Spirit,

born of the virgin Mary,

suffered under Pontius Pilate,

was crucified, died, and was buried;

he descended to the dead.

On the third day he rose again;

he ascended into heaven,

he is seated at the right hand of the Father,

and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

I believe in the Holy Spirit,

the holy catholic church,

the communion of saints,

the forgiveness of sins,

the resurrection of the body,

and the life everlasting.

THANKSGIVING AT THE FONT

Water is poured into the font during the thanksgiving.

The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Holy God, holy and merciful, holy and mighty, you are the river of life, you are the everlasting wellspring, you are the fire of rebirth.

Glory to you for oceans and lakes, for rivers and streams. Honor to you for cloud and rain, for dew and snow. Your waters are below us, around us, above us: our life is born in you. You are the fountain of resurrection.

Praise to you for your saving waters: Noah and the animals survive the flood, Hagar discovers your well. The Israelites escape through the sea, and they drink from your gushing rock. Naaman washes his leprosy away, and the Samaritan woman will never be thirsty again.

At this font, holy God, we pray: Praise to you for the water of baptism and for your Word that saves us in this water. Breathe your Spirit into all who are gathered here and into all creation. Illumine our days. Enliven our bones. Dry our tears. Wash away the sin within us, and drown the evil around us.

Satisfy all our thirst with your living water, Jesus Christ, our Savior, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

Amen.

BAPTISM

The presiding minister baptizes the candidate:

Patrick William Burian, I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Amen.

The presiding minister continues:

Let us pray.

We give you thanks, O God, that through water and the Holy Spirit you give this son new birth, cleanse him from sin, and raise him to eternal life.

LAYING ON OF HANDS

Laying both hands on the head of the newly baptized, the minister prays:

Sustain Patrick with the gift of your Holy Spirit: the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the Lord, the spirit of joy in your presence, both now and forever.

Amen.

SIGN OF THE CROSS

The presiding minister marks the sign of the cross on the forehead of the baptized. As the sign of the cross is made, the minister says:

Patrick, child of God, you have been sealed by the Holy Spirit and marked with the cross of Christ forever.

Amen.

IMAGE OF BAPTISM

Clothed with Christ in baptism, the newly baptized receives a baptismal blanket.

Joined with the great multitude of the communion of saints, you have been clothed in the righteousness of Christ to stand before the throne of the Lamb.

WELCOME

A candle is lit from the Paschal candle and given to the family as a representative of the congregation says:

Let your light so shine before others that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven.

A representative of the congregation leads the assembly in the welcome:


Let us welcome the newly baptized.

A reading from Hebrews:



LECTIONARY 33, PROPER 28 (YEAR B)

During November, the scripture readings lead the worshipping assembly to visions of the last day, to a reflection of the resurrection of the body and life everlasting. Some religious people see only panic and doom in the future. They dwell in the land of fear. The conclusion of the Lord's Prayer offers another view: the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and forever. It is a bold confession of faith in God, who is our refuge and our strength. Such a hope, according to Hebrews, leads us to encourage one another in love and good deeds.

BUILDING SECURITY

We are happy to report that as of November 6, we have fifty-one pledges total with \$266,380 going to the HERE campaign and another \$13,970 for BEYOND.



UPDATE FROM ST. PAUL'S SCHOOL BOARD OF DIRECTORS

We last reported in September that we had to reopen the search for an Early Education Administrator for St. Paul's School when the new hire resigned her position after two weeks into her tenure. We initiated another search, and although we believed we had a viable candidate, the search was ultimately unsuccessful. We had established a timeline to achieve critical milestones that must have been met for us to be positioned to offer classes beginning in January. Those deadlines passed without filling the Administrator position, so we have been compelled to further postpone reopening the school. We will not be in a position to offer classes beginning in January as we had hoped. But the Board has not lost its resolve. At our board meeting this week, we set our sights on initiating an aggressive recruiting campaign in March 2025 with the goal of having an administrator in place by May so we can open for classes in August. We ask you to continue to pray for success in hiring an administrator and staff, in order to offer classes again in Fall, 2025. We firmly believe that God will send us, in God's own time, new leadership for our school! Thank you for your continued prayers and support.
