ST. PAUL'S WEEKLY EPISTLE Important News for the Week of December 1, 2024

FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT (YEAR C)

In prayer and song, the liturgy of Advent announces God's vision of a world transformed by grace: justice will triumph, love will abound, the earth will be a place of safety. The power of evil, sin, and death will be utterly vanquished in the dawning light of redemption. Yet already the church experiences the vision in word and sacrament, in the communion of believers, in every gesture and word of justice and peace. A righteous branch springs up from David: in baptism we have been grafted into Christ's life and mission.

HAPPY NEW YEAR

Confusion. Foreboding. Fear. These words from the Gospel of Luke kick off the first Sunday of Advent in year C. It's hard to find a place for these heavy emotions in either the secular or religious traditions that precede Jesus' birth, but this year's Advent texts remind us that healing can be a painful, complicated process, even—or especially—with the promise of comfort and joy to come. Luke, both evangelist and physician, would have known that fractured bones sometimes need to be rebroken in order to heal properly.

A MEANINGFUL ADVENT

Although the historical record is sketchy, it appears that our Advent arose out of a season of fasting to prepare for baptisms at Epiphany. By the sixth century, an eschatological emphasis was present. Our Advent comprises the four Sundays before Christmas. Each year, the first Sunday deals with our readiness for divine judgment, the second Sunday the ministry of John the Baptist, the third Sunday the Baptist's call to a repentant life, and only on the fourth Sunday a narrative concerning the birth of Jesus. God comes, in the past in the history of Israel and the incarnation of Jesus, in the present in the word and sacrament of each Sunday and in the sufferings of our time, and in the future at the end of all things. The lectionary appoints readings to fit this pattern, and its tone stands in stark contrast to our society's weeks of preparation for Christmas. Liturgical advice to keep a meaningful Advent without a December-long celebration of Christmas is meant not to be a kill-joy, but to awake our longing for the surprising ways that God comes to us. We mean to be a people who know what time it is and are willing to wait for what will come—a people who do not sing Easter hymns during Lent nor Christmas hymns in Advent.
