

God is faithful, and will not let you be tested beyond your strength, but with the testing God will also provide the way out so that you may be able to endure it.





The word "prodigat is commonly used to an advantage squanders his inheritance. Yet, this parable invites us to consider how God's grace is also prodigal – extravagant, lavish, illogical. This parable disrupts and expands our definitions of grace. Once again, grace is not earned. After wasting his resources, the younger son becomes destitute and returns home to his father, saying, "I am no longer worthy." His father, instead, greets him with a celebration and the fatted calf. The older son, in contrast, has done everything "right" – he's tried to perform, work hard, check all the boxes – but he forgets how to celebrate. How might you receive and extend prodigal grace?

CONNECTIONS WITH CREATION

Despite the frustration of the landowner in today's parable, trees don't necessarily produce fruit every year, especially in stressful conditions. Instead of learning about or caring for his tree, the landowner assumes it is faulty —a "waste of soil." It is curious that many interpreters assume that the landowner in this parable is God, given he demands the fig tree produce or perish. Instead, the landowner's frustration sounds all too human; when something doesn't bend to our will, we call it a waste —but God does not. Christ has never called us a waste of soil —or a waste of grace. Indeed it is Jesus, who is associated with the gardener, who cares for us and feeds us so we might be fruitful anew.

What I Forgot

Sometimes I wish I was the fig tree. No fruit here, just soaking up the sun, growing roots, turning green, stretching out my branches until I can hug the horizon. Sometimes I wish I was the fig tree, because she doesn't produce, and she's not exhausted. and she probably gets eight hours of sleep at night. And her branches, unlike my shoulders, are not heavy with workpulled toward the ground, threatening to break. And her trunk. unlike my spine, is not fighting to stand tall while holding it all together. Sometimes I wish I was the fig tree because she knows what I forgot many years ago.

You are still worthy even if you don't produce.

PALM SUNDAY OF THE PASSION

As Jesus enters Jerusalem, the multitude of disciples begins to joyfully shout with praise. The Pharisees try to silence them, but Jesus responds: "I tell you, even if these were silent, the stones would shout out." All of creation cries out with praise—that message rises above the noise, even if the oppressive powers want to silence it. As we begin our walk through Holy Week, let us ask: What can't be silenced? What must be said? What things can we not stay quiet about? What is bubbling up that we need to give voice to—faith questions, apologies, issues of justice, truth-telling? As we go deeper into the story, the truth will soon be set free.

In a room full to the brim with emotion, Jesus offers a tender, loving, and humble goodbye, stooping low to wash and caress his disciples' feet. Like the water splashing within the washbasin, his actions ripple out: "Go and do likewise. Just as I have loved you, love one another." We can't fully give without receiving also; love is designed to be shared. As is the case for Peter, receiving selfless, poured out love fundamentally changes us. It's a practice of surrender and letting go. It reminds us of how God loves us. And so, on this evening, remove the walls and protective layers you have built up. Allow yourself to be loved fully by God. Allow yourself to be filled to the brim so you can go out and fill others too.
