We want to embody the resurrection, but often we'd rather stay the same than begin again. We want to have the courage to be like the women on that Easter morning—to run and speak truth, but often we are weary of courage and uncertain of our own voices. Forgive us for all the ways we remain unchanged.

Break into our hearts. Overflow here. With hope we pray. Amen.

Family of faith, if there is life after death, then you can be certain—there is life after mess. There is life after mistakes. There is life after doubt. There is new life freely given, and that life is for you. In the name of the risen Christ, you are forgiven, + loved, and claimed. May we live full to the brim in response. Thanks be to God, and let it be so. Alleluia! Amen.

³⁴Peter began to speak to [the people]: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, ³⁵but in every nation anyone who is God-fearing and does what is right is acceptable to God. ³⁶"You know the message God sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ—who is Lord of all. ³⁷That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: ³⁸how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how Jesus went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. ³⁹We are witnesses to all that he did both in

Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; ⁴⁰but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, ⁴¹not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. ⁴²"Jesus commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. ⁴³All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."



²⁰ But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died. ²¹ For since death came through a human being, the resurrection of the dead has also come through a human being; ²² for as all die in Adam, so all will be made alive in Christ. ²³ But each in the proper order: Christ the first fruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ. ²⁴ Then comes the end, when Christ hands over the dominion to God, the Father, after destroying every ruler and every authority and power. ²⁵ For Christ must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. ²⁶ The last enemy to be destroyed is death.

He is not here, but has risen. ⁶ Remember how he told you, while he was still in Galilee, ⁷ that the Son-of-Man must be handed over to sinners, and be crucified, and on the third day rise again." ⁸ Then the women remembered his words, ⁹ and returning from the tomb, they told all this to the eleven and to all the rest. ¹⁰ Now it was Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary the mother of James, and the other women with them who told this to the apostles. ¹¹ But these words seemed to them an idle tale, and they did not believe them. ¹² But Peter got up and ran to the tomb; stooping and looking in, he saw the linen cloths by themselves; then he went home, amazed at what had happened.


This is an expansive Table. There is food for everyone. There is a seat for everyone. There is love for everyone. There is no scarcity here, because this is God's Table, so all are welcome.






