

⁹During the night Paul had a vision: there stood a man of Macedonia pleading with him and saying, "Come over to Macedonia and help us." ¹⁰ When he had seen the vision, we immediately tried to cross over to Macedonia, being convinced that God had called us to proclaim the good news to them.

¹¹ We therefore set sail from Troas and took a straight course to Samothrace, the following day to Neapolis, ¹² and from there to Philippi, which is a leading city of the district of Macedonia and a Roman colony. We remained in this city for some days. ¹³ On the Sabbath day we went outside the gate by the river, where we supposed there was a place of prayer, and we sat down and spoke to the women who had gathered there. ¹⁴ A certain woman named Lydia, a worshiper of God, was listening to us; she was from the city of Thyatira and a dealer in purple cloth. The Lord opened her heart to listen eagerly to what was said by Paul. ¹⁵ When she and her household were baptized, she urged us, saying, "If you have judged me to be faithful to the Lord, come and stay at my home." And she prevailed upon us.



throne of God and of the Lamb will be in it, and his servants will worship him; ⁴ they will see his face, and his name will be on their foreheads. ⁵ And there will be no more night; they need no light of lamp or sun, for the Lord God will be their light, and they will reign forever and ever.

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LET THE CHILDREN COME

"Those who love me will keep my word, and my Father will love them, and we will come to them and make our home with them" (John 14:23). What wild and good news this is! If we love God, then God and Jesus will come and make their home with us! What kind of home would God want? What kind of home would make Jesus feel most welcome? What kind of home would the children want? What kind of home would make them feel most welcome? Brainstorming together with the kids will help the whole congregation think about these questions.

CONNECTIONS WITH CREATION

Purple is usually the color of Lent, not Easter. Yet purple fits this day with Lydia, "a dealer in purple cloth" (Acts 16:14). Purple was associated with wealth because purple dye was rare and laborious to produce, extracted from mucus secretions of Murex sea snails. It took thousands of snails to extract enough, which could be done while the creature was alive but often involved killing them. Our clothing may not require snails but often is resource intensive—in fertilizer for cotton, in water and chemicals for leather, using fossil fuels for synthetics, with human lives in sweatshops. How do you balance the comfort and appearance of your clothing with the environmental costs involved?


MEMORIAL DAY

Memorial Day started as a good idea from an organization made up of Union Civil War veterans, the Grand Army of the Republic. These veterans lobbied state and local governments across the former union to recognize May 30 as a day of remembrance, originally known as "Decoration Day."

They chose May 30 because no battles happened on that day. Over the next 100 years, Decoration Day morphed into Memorial Day, which is now observed on the last Monday in May.

Congress eventually changed the observance to the last Monday in May as a way to give federal employees a set of standard three-day weekends -- and widen the observance of the day.

Every Memorial Day at 3 p.m. local time, please take a moment to observe the National Moment of Remembrance. For just one full minute, Americans everywhere should pause to remember all the men and women who died in service to our country.
